The branches in turn have a responsibility to the state to send representatives to their board meetings and conventions, as well as participate in the trainings provided.

Several of us attended the State Board meeting on the October 18th: Markonette Richardson, Judy Flood, Gail Viamonte and Mary McGrath. Judy is state treasurer, Markonette is state VP for Programs, and Roxann King is state membership chair. AACo Branch is well represented this year. However, we came back with some homework to do which will involve other members of our branch.

The AAUW 2015 State Convention will be held on April 25, 2015 at Montgomery College in Rockville. Each branch is asked to select their members as delegates to the convention. Our branch membership allows us several delegates. Please consider becoming a delegate representing our county.

A second activity is to provide a person from our branch to serve on the state nominating committee for the state board of director's spring elections. We will have more information soon regarding this position. It will be a great opportunity for you to meet and work with AAUW women at the state level.

A third responsibility we have as a branch is to support the leadership training sessions put on by the state by attending each training. Our branch has funds to help pay for members to attend these sessions. It would be wonderful if we could send at least two (or more) representatives to the sessions held each year. This training will add to your leadership skills, which in turn can be a great benefit to our branch.

ON PUBLIC POLICY

As usual there is a lot (almost too much) to say on these topics! America is a busy place, with lots of differing opinions, and AAUW want to be sure our opinions are noted.

As our stickers say "It's my vote, and I will be heard." First of all, let's mention some of the events which help us to decide and to show forcefully that we support the issues that are listed as AAUW priorities.

On the State Level

As you know we have interim elections coming up in less than a week. Early voting begins on Oct. 23, and voting on the regular date is Tuesday Nov.4. It is a priority of ours to influence the number of people who vote! It's called "Get out the Vote" and the importance of that phrase to our democracy cannot be stated strongly.

To that end, we just recently co-sponsored a "Political Forum" on the topic of the two (men in this case) who are seeking the office of County Executive of Anne Arundel County, Our cosponsors were The League of Women Voters and the Jewish Women's organization of Anne Arundel County. The idea of such a political forum or debate is to help to influence the election by letting the candidates hear what you think; by asking them questions that cause them to share their visions so that the voter does not go into that voting booth "blind". Our candidates (Steve Schuh-R) and (George Johnson-D) certainly were well questioned, and those who were able to attend said it was a very enlightening evening! We had a turnout of about 70 to 80 people. Thanks to all who helped to make it possible.

The only other race in Maryland at this time (beside local ones) is the big one for Governor of the State. And in that race we have Anthony Brown –D (who presently holds office of lieutenant governor under Martin O'Malley) and Larry Hogan-R. Also on the State level, I want to make you all aware of the upcoming MLAW (Maryland Legislative Agenda for Women) fall meeting. It will be held on Sat., Nov.15 in Ellicott City and costs \$35 (includes breakfast) or \$45 (that includes lunch). Our branch of AAUW is a formal member of this important organization that addresses laws that affect women in our State, so any of our members is eligible to attend. 
